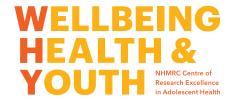

Why it matters

Researchers and young people work together to understand current situations and explore future scenarios that identify possible consequences and outcomes of different decisions.

Description

Future scenarios is a participatory, collaborative and speculative method that surfaces the different actors, actions and consequences of possible futures. A variety of brainstorming and mapping activities are used to generate views and visions of how things could be.

Purpose

To identify future challenges and opportunities about complex issues with a systems-thinking approach. For example, exploring the interrelationship between healthcare, technology, and society, rather than examining one issue in isolation.

Outcome

Shared learning and decision-making in systemic and inclusive ways with young people

Benefits

Young people and researchers can quickly identify areas for further research and change using non-traditional research methods





The WH&Y CRE Co-creating digital health futures with young people sub-project

The project sought to:

- Oldentify the stakeholder, driving forces, possible digital health future scenarios and implications of these for decision makers from the perspective of young people
- O Generate scenarios about healthcare futures to share with researchers and policymakers; and,
- O Inform the development of future research projects on digital health.

Two workshops were conducted:

- 1. To explore the range of influences, driving forces and ideas that could emerge in healthcare futures
- 2. To explore young people's feelings and responses towards the different scenarios and to generate ideas for future research

Findings were used to inform WH&Y CRE project proposals and led to further research on digital health.
